ICA in Curação Travel Writing on a Not-So-Lonely Planet: Ethics, Independence, and Influence

June 4-June 24, 2018



Visit and study on the Caribbean-Dutch island of Curaçao, and explore what it means to be a travel writer in 2018. Curaçao's unique aggregation of politics, tourism, oil, environmentalism, languages, and religions provides a prime opportunity to understand a reporter's ethical responsibilities. The best travel writing offers readers an understanding of a country's culture and history beyond the requisite descriptions of food and sunsets. Explore these issues in depth while you explore Curaçao's culture, history, economy, and beauty.

Eligibility, Prerequisites, and Academic Credit

No prerequisites. Preference will be given to Creative Writing Minors, Professional Writing Minors, and English Majors with the Creative Writing Concentration. This program is open to all students in good academic standing (above a 2.0 GPA). The on-site course will be 4 credits in WRT 272. There will be two required lectures on campus in SP18. On return, FALL 2018, WRT 301 (1 credit) is recommended, but not required.

Application and Study Abroad Deposit Deadlines

November 6, 2017: Online application & \$50 application fee due

December 1, 2017: \$500 non-refundable deposit is due

February 16, 2018: Final payment and ICA health forms due

Program Costs

The tentative cost of the program is \$5,275. This fee includes lodging, most meals, transportation within Curaçao as well as seminars, entrance fees, and insurance. This price also includes international airfare from the gateway city (TBD) to Curaçao and back to the US gateway city.

Financial Aid

All students are eligible to apply for an OIS ICA scholarship, which is also due <u>November 6, 2017</u>. The scholarship can be found online at **abroad.goucher.edu**. If you are a Pell Grant recipient and US citizen studying abroad in one country for at least 3 weeks (21 days), you are eligible to apply for the Gilman scholarship where you can be awarded up to \$3,000 in aid for your study abroad.
